To what extent do Assange's personal biases and questionable personal life choices (including relationships and family) affect how we talk about his supposedly anti-corruption ethics and actions?

Assange seemed more open to Trump and opposed to Clinton, and may have coordinated with Russian hackers; he is libertarian and not as opposed to capitalism as he is to the actions of the state. How do these political biases impact the work that he does and the ethics of information and rights that he espouses?

Assange has dismissed claims of rape, sexual assault, misogyny, and anti-semitism as attempts by political adversaries to discredit him. How do we take these allegations seriously while remaining open to the possibility that he's right in that he is an enemy of multiple influential states which seek to discredit and suppress him?

Zizek writs, "Assange, Manning, Snowden, these are our new heroes, exemplary cases of the new ethics that befits our era of digitalised control." Should we avoid grouping all three together? Do they represent something unified, or are the differences between them important/meaningful?

Chelsea Manning

Coming out as a transgender woman in an all-male prison facility, Manning was placed in solitary confinement for twenty-three hours a day, "for her safety"—an act that the UN has denounced as tourture. In what ways, if any, does her treatement reflect social views of trans women?

Manning has a very active Twitter presence. What role do you think social media has played in the construction of her public identity?

It has recently come to light (via social media) that Manning has been associating with Mike Cernovich, a member of the alt-right who, among other things, propagated the so-called "Pizzagate" conspiracy theory. Does this new information alter your perception of her? If so, in what ways? If not, why? How should we account for and address her multiplicity of identities?

Speaking more broadly, the individuals discussed today have little or no higher education experience. Regardless, all have occupied or continue to occupy positions of great power over the dissemination and control of information. In what ways does this influence the privileged position of the university as source of

On a related note, how might this leak's trustworthiness or authenticity be related to the fact that the documents were leaked to journalists, and not directly to the public? What is the significance for this leak of the journalistmediators?

What is the significance of this being a governmental leak that focuses on the US and UK governments? In particular, how is this leak different from the Cambridge Analytica Facebook scandal? In what ways is it the same?
